On the 4th of August, a group of 20 middle school students, along with 2 teachers, Siobhan and James, went on an excursion to Adelaide's Science Alive. This was a unique experience focused on getting kids from many schools across Adelaide more interested in learning about STEM subjects through the use of more than 80 visual and hands-on exhibits. It also showcased possible career paths for students interested in these subjects, as there were multiple universities demonstrating their activities. It was a really fun and fulfilling day for all the students who attended, providing a great learning experience.

Cyber Safety Seminar

In week 3, the Carly Ryan Foundation came to our school to give a seminar on cyber safety. They educated us on the story of Carly Ryan, and the many dangers online.

The Carly Ryan Foundation is a not for profit organisation dedicated to protect and inform children on how to use the internet safely. It was formed by CEO Sonya Ryan, who's young fifteen year old daughter, Carly Ryan was tricked into meeting a man whom she met online. Carly thought she was speaking to a young 18yr old musician, Brandon Kane. However, in reality she was speaking to 50yr old predator, Greg Newman. Unfortunately this resulted in Carly loosing her life. Carly was the first person in Australia to loose her life to an online predator.

"It was very informative, and we learned how to stop people tracking us online," - Millie Sturt, Year 7.



They talked to us about a number of things including how to manage your privacy settings; by making sure nobody can see your location, what to do on online platforms and games if someone is using the chat or messaging you in inappropriate ways; the sensible thing to do is just to block the person or leave the game. They also informed us of different ways people use the internet to get inappropriate images or footage, money and other things, as well as teaching us how to avoid and/or deal with it. They used a number of real life examples, including two informative and eye opening stories which helped us to understand the real dangers of the internet.

We also discussed other social media platforms like TikTok, Snapchat and Instagram. It was explained how these platforms mine your data by monitoring your reactions, location and audio. You can stop these platforms from gathering this information through a few simple steps in your settings. Your location can be found easily by Snap map, and that the easiest way to stop it is to turn the settings onto Ghost Mode, so no-one can see your location for however long you choose.

"I feel safer now that I know how to be safe on my phone," Arlia Helps, a Year 7 student, explained.



After visiting our school, The Carly Ryan foundation also held another seminar for the parents. They informed them how to unsure that their children are safe online, as well as educating them on how their children can set up the correct security measures to prevent them from being in any danger.



SPACE MUSEUM EXCURSION

On the Monday of Week 4 this term, the Year 8s and 9s went on an excursion to Lot 14, home of the Australian Space Discovery Centre. The day started at the Noarlunga Train Station, where the students participating in the excursion met before travelling into the city together via train. Before the 12'oclock workshop at the Australian Space Discovery Centre, the students walked around the city, passing well-known Adelaide landmarks such as the Torrens River, Adelaide Oval and the Botanic Gardens.

Once the workshop began, the 8s and 9s were given a presentation on satellites, and their uses, before being presented with their goal of the workshop - to design a satellite that has the ability to measure some sort of weather on Earth, such as surface temperature or ocean temperature. Students then divided into groups of three where they went about planning their satellites, making sure to consider every element that they would need to construct their hypothetical satellite. To get inspiration, students were able to wander around the centre, where they could find many helpful resources as well as interactive games and challenges. This excursion provided students with a better understanding of space and the work behind the many projects and creations involved in our everyday lives, as well as careers in space.





Throughout the term the students will be using a booklet with sections and deadlines that need to be completed by a certain week. This will keep the students from falling behind and it will help keep them on task.

The students will also need to find a way to advertise their product. This could be through a variety of different options such as the schools social media, posters, school notes etc. The aim of the advertisements is to encourage more customers to come to their stalls and buy their products.

Some small buisness's the students have come up with include: Cookie in a jar, Candles, Coasters and Marmalade.

This term students have formed small groups to create their own business using the schools Occupations budget. The purpose of this task is to sell their products at an end of year Market. The profit made will go back into the school occupations fund.

The students will have to calculate the costs of their products and the costs of the items they will need to get to create their product. Students have also been tasked with making sure they stay inside the 150-dollar limit, to add to the challenge they will make sure that wherever they get their materials from is ethically sourced.



Asian Elephants are classified by the IUCN as endangered with an estimation that there are less than 52,000 Asian Elephants remaining in the wild, making regionally coordinated conservation programs more critical than ever.

By bringing the elephants to Monarto Safari Park, Zoos SA will play an important role in raising awareness of elephant conservation.
