## MONTESSORI MOMENT #7 - 2023

Education is the best weapon for peace.

Maria Montessori

Many of us are familiar with Maria Montessori's approach to education. But Montessori's far-reaching influence wasn't confined to education. In addition to being a brilliant scientist, philosopher, and physician, Montessori was also a tireless advocate for women's rights and peace through education. After surviving two world wars and spending a lifetime observing the development of children, Montessori fully understood the connection between peace and the way we educate our children.

It is important to start at an early age to build capacity and equip children to engage with issues of peace and conflict as this is when attitudes are shaped. Her writings explicitly make a connection to education for peace. She passionately argued that education was a means—perhaps the only genuine means—of eliminating war once and for all. Without explicit and intentional ethical education, she believed, humankind would inevitably revert to its habit of war.

\*Values such as global citizenship, personal responsibility, and respect for diversity, she argued, must be both an implicit and explicit part of every child's education. These values in Montessori education are every bit as crucial as the subjects of math, language, or science. She wrote in Education and Peace, "Peace is a goal that can only be attained through common accord, and the means to achieve this unity for peace are twofold: first, an immediate effort to resolve conflicts without recourse to violence—in other words, to prevent war—and second, a long-term effort to establish a lasting peace among men" (Montessori, 1949, p. 27).

Consciously developing the habit of critical and independent thought can protect us from falling prey to propaganda which paints biased, one-sided, and therefore limited views of complex, multifaceted issues. Yet, despite the passage of time, and the recurrence of political conflicts, we seem to learn very slowly, if at all. Our world is not a peaceful place and the need to find ways to respond more effectively grows daily. Violence affects everyone. It divides, prevents communities from developing, stops children going to school, destroys vital infrastructure that has taken generations to establish and millions to maintain...who benefits then?

Peacebuilding is a long-term process of encouraging people to talk, repairing relationships, and reforming governments and institutions. For positive change to last, everyone affected must be involved in the process of bridge-building. It means bringing different groups together to discuss the issues and listen to the viewpoints of others respectfully, even when we do not agree. Peace is built when we break down stereotypes and when different groups work together.

In our school we endeavour to use restorative justice practices which include:

- Understanding the impact of one's actions
- · Taking responsibility for our choices
- · Identifying ways to repair and prevent future conflict
- Working to build healthy relationships
- · Developing conflict resolution skills
- · Creating a sense of belonging and agency.

If we aspire to raising mindful, peaceful children we might also consider the following:

#### 1 Listen first, then listen more...

Before we can understand, we need to grasp what the child is feeling – and it's easy to leap to conclusions. By listening attentively, giving them our undivided attention in that moment, and thinking calmly about all they're telling us, we show respect. Listening and responding this way also shows children how to do the same thing in their interactions with others. It helps them develop good listening and communication skills from an early age.

#### 2. Unplug

Unplugging from the constant social chatter and 24-hour news feed, gives us an opportunity to recenter. It quiets our thoughts, helps us think creatively and independently, allows us to work through struggles, problem solve, and navigate emotional territory with greater clarity. Children need role-models and who better to fulfil this role than we, the parents? Children learn by watch us.

#### 3. Carve out time to just be together

There is a lot going on around us all the time. And with the constant contact and stimulus of phones and social media, it can seem downright impossible to find a moment to 'smell those roses!'. But, having a shared pursuit, a walk, a bike ride, a bedtime snuggle, a chapter story that you both can't wait to return to, can offer windows of calmness and connectedness.

## **PRESCHOOL**

# Measurement in the Preschool

This term in the preschool we are having a maths focus on measurement.

When exploring concepts like measurement with very young children we do it in a very hands on and practical way. At this young age, it is all about introducing the basic vocabulary and giving them the opportunities to inquire, compare and make discoveries for themselves.

Our term started with basic measurement of length. We compared our heights and measured a range of familiar objects using non-standard measurement at first (cubes). We then moved on to a measurement hunt around the school and playground with a meter long piece of string to find things, longer, shorter and the same. We introduced a meter ruler, to begin to introduce the concept of a standard unit of measure.

Last week we began to explore volume and capacity. This involved lots of scooping, pouring, funnels and jars. We introduced the vocabulary of empty, full, nearly empty, nearly full and half full. The children had the opportunity to hypothesize on which cup would hold most and then count how many scoops each cup could hold.

One of the most fun, practical activities to teach measurement is cooking. Cooking activities involve both non-standard (such as 'a pinch') and standard units of measure (cup, grams, mls). Over the next few weeks we will explore other forms of measurement, such as weight and time.















## **CYCLE 1 - RECEPTION**

It's hard to believe we are already nearing the end of your child's first year of school! Even so, we are still extremely busy, and the children are doing a great job keeping up with the pace as they continue to learn and experience new things.

A snapshot of some of the learning we are enjoying and things we will be doing this term includes:

- Zoology, where we will focus on the five classes of vertebrates. We will also be focusing specifically on mammals and animal habitats.
- The narrative story of The Sheep and the Goat
- · Sport's Day
- Excursion to the Adelaide Zoo
- · Learning about our Five Senses in Science
- · Transition sessions to our new classrooms for next year
- · Reception Graduation Ceremony

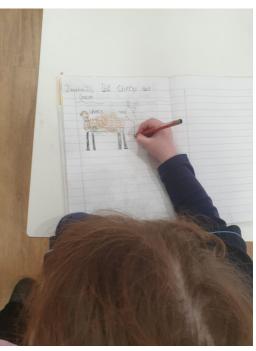
We will also have a whole school excursion, as well as a range of fun end of year activities. We will keep you updated as the term progresses with the details of these events.

## CYCLE 2

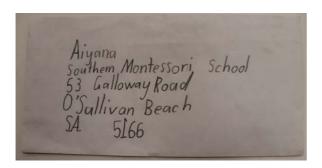
Over the course of this Semester, Cycle 2 have been thinking about "Our Place". We've discussed how places that are special to us make us feel safe and happy and are most often familiar spaces such as school and home. It was wonderful to hear how many of the children chose our classrooms as the place they feel safest – what a testament to how we welcome and nurture our pupils!

Kookaburra and Emu class began writing to pen pals from a school in Para Hills and we began sharing maps and descriptions of our school and other places that mean a great deal to us. The children learnt important mapping skills as well as how to apply some of the grammar we have been learning to make our letters interesting to read. We drafted our letters before replying which allowed us to perfect them before we sent them. When we got replies it was incredibly exciting. Although the other school is only about an hour away, they have a very different surrounding environment and it was fascinating to read their descriptions of the playground and areas around their school. We hope to continue writing to our new pen pals!

As part of this unit, and with summer around the corner, we have also been discussing how to stay safe in the sun! The children have been learning the "slip, slop, slap, seek slide" (try saying that fast!) song and have created some wonderful artwork to remind everyone about the best ways to protect our body from sun damage. It was great to see everyone slapping on a hat and slopping on sunscreen during our warm and sunny sports day!

For the next part of this topic we will be learning about water safety, particularly relevant with the summer holidays coming up, and long, sunny days at the beach (hopefully) in store. So if you're not quite sure how to stay safe at the sunny beach this year? Ask a Cycle 2 Student!

## CYCLE 3

Term 4 has begun with a bang...excursions, sports day, and days spent working at Middle School.

Term 4 is always a real highlight in Cycle 3 as the students drive their own learning with their work for our major project to be displayed at showcase night. This year we are learning about Ancient Civilizations, with a strong focus on Ancient Egypt. The project will centre around learning about how ancient civilizations met their Fundamental Needs, and the implications that their discoveries and inventions have on our lives today.

We look forward to welcoming families on Friday 8th December to view the students' completed projects. In Week 3 we visited the South Australian Museum and Adelaide Botanic Gardens to learn more about Ancient Egypt. In the gardens we were able to see plants that were important to the civilization. These included: papyrus, which grew abundantly along the Nile and was used to make paper; trees used to craft boats and furniture; and herbs used for medicinal purposes and mummification. The students loved their time at the museum, not only learning more about Ancient Egypt but enjoying exploring the whole museum. Such a fun day out in town.

- I enjoyed trying to decipher the Rosetta Stone in the Egyptian room at the museum.
- The Egyptian room was really cool, and I enjoyed seeing the mammals.
- I enjoyed seeing the Giant Squid and learning how long it was.
- I learnt about mummies and that males were wrapped in red.
- I enjoyed seeing the Papyrus plant at the Botanic Gardens.

Last week the students of Cycle 3 'took over' the Middle School campus for two days whilst the Year 7, 8 and 9 students are away on camp. This gave students the opportunity to work in this environment without the older students present and become familiar with the facilities and local area. During these two days the students participated in an outdoor photo scavenger hunt, some Egyptian art, a STEM challenge and enjoyed making and eating some yummy snacks.
